## **David versus David?**

Elite triathletes set up 'high-stakes' wager for Brian's Hope

BRANFORD - Message to all high rollers on the Shoreline: It's game on this Sunday at the Hammerfest triathlon at the Owenego Beach and Tennis Club.

Specifically, David Demres, 2016 Olympic hopeful, going head to head against David Ellis, devoted family man and triathlon hobbyist.

Demres placed first in 2011, Ellis in 2012. Now each is betting \$20 on himself to prevail, the proceeds of which go to Brian's Hope, an organization formed to raise research funds and awareness of adrenoleukodystrophy, or ALD, and named for Branford's Brian Kelley, 25, who's suffered from the debilitating genetic disorder since he was 6.

For those interested in getting in on the action — the Davids are requesting \$5 or more — here's the lowdown. Demres, 24, the Olympic hopeful, fractured his wrist earlier this summer; that wrist spent spent six weeks in a cast. Ellis, 30, the family man-hobbyist, just posted a personal best in an Olympic-distance triathlon in late August.

But perhaps the ultimate tell: in 2011, Demres shot by Ellis in the final stretch of the race.
